- AIDN's "Global Development Leadership Series" (<u>August 2024</u>; <u>October 2024</u>; <u>March 2025</u>).
 The Global Development Leadership Dialogue Series is a joint initiative of the Australian
 Council for International Development (ACFID) and the Australian International Development
 Network (AIDN). The series brings together senior leaders from across Australia representing
 government, international NGOs (INGOs) and private capital.
- In January 2025, Donald Trump signed an executive order freezing all foreign development assistance for 90 days. From March 2025 onwards, AIDN hosted a series of <u>Emergency</u> <u>Briefing webinars</u> and roundtables with Philanthropy Australia, Unlock AID, Adara Development and World Vision Australia.
- AIDN's and XSPI's "<u>Locally led development in Papua New Guinea</u>: <u>Looking to community</u>
 driven solutions" 2025 webinar. Alongside an expert panel, in this webinar AIDN explores the
 dynamics of development in Papua New Guinea, where substantial foreign aid, particularly
 from Australia, has yet to translate into meaningful community-level impact.
- AIDN's "Resilience amidst turmoil Myanmar at three years post-coup" 2024 webinar. Led by AIDN, an expert panel discusses the historical roots of Myanmar's conflict and sheds light on the staggering toll on ordinary people over the last three years. The panel considers the outlook for the country, providing insights into the challenges and potential paths towards resolution.
